## **June 17 - Program by Sherman Jones**

During the Civil War small arms consisted of an incredible variety of muskets, rifles, carbines, revolvers, and even shotguns. Small arms, in the hands of both Union and Confederate soldiers, accounted for half of the 633,000 killed and wounded.

In 1861, neither the United States nor the Confederate States were prepared to fight a major war. Peace, a small standing army, and a largely ceremonial state militia system combined to severely limit stockpiles of military supplies. The most serious shortage was the lack of up-to-date small arms.

As volunteers rushed forward to join both armies every type of firearm suitable for military purposes was used. Many early volunteers found themselves armed with antiquated weapons, some dating back to the War of 1812.

In the North, Colt, Sharps, and Remington geared up for production and introduced a number of technically advanced small arms which would begin to revolutionize warfare including the magazine-fed breech loading Spencer Carbine.
